Dear Guild members,

Another beautiful autumn surrounds us. I love the crisp air, the tumble of the leaves caught by the wind, and the metamorphosis of color everywhere. I am trying to soak it in before the stretch of winter days sets in.

I am fresh from a quilt retreat at Cross Roads in New Jersey. It was fun to think of another group of you doing the same further north at the Heritage retreat. Retreats are a wonderful way to recharge and focus. During this retreat, I noted the uniqueness of everyone's processes, the challenges we give ourselves and the joy we receive from resolving them. I loved seeing the design walls build over the course of days. Some are led by mathematical minds, making calculations of color and proportion as they build their creations. Others are lost in the process — positioning a sliver of color here and then there while looking and responding— having a conversation with a bit of colored fabric. Others still, come prepared with organized stacks of precut shapes, methodically stitching them together, as the geometry comes into being. Whether methodical, intuitive, or improvisational, the walls become alive with color and pattern under experienced hands and eyes. And always at retreats, there are quilters at your side to ask a question of, pose a solution, note a relationship, or consider an alternative. Ideas and camaraderie abound. If you have never been on one, I highly recommend it!

Don't miss our November meeting! We have Susan Sato's vending with her colorful Easy Piecing company; our annual, Members teaching Members mini-demonstrations; and after the meeting, an in-person Hawaiian appliqué workshop with Lois Strasberg and Micki Segel.

November Programming: Members Teaching Members

ne of the Guild's favorite programs, Members Teaching Members, will be featured at the November meeting. A Scandinavian woven star ornament, a chunky fabric necklace, a quilted zipper bag and a fabric-covered book are the items you will learn to make.

Members will have a chance to see all of the demonstrations as they move from table to table. Although members won't be making the items at the meeting, they will get to see how they are made and the demonstrators will supply printed handouts and/or links for reference.

MADI APPELL will show how to make a fabric-covered book. She uses plain Xerox paper to create the pages, and oaktag covered with fabric for the cover. "The books can be any size and they are simple to make," Madi says, "and they are great for gifts. Children can color in them or adults can use them for notes. You can also personalize them with embroidery or decorate them with patches if you want to. They can be very simple or you can really embellish them."

The Scandinavian star to be demonstrated by **ANNETTE WALLACE** requires only scraps of four different fabrics. "The stars are pretty easy to make," she says. "There's no sewing required. You can attach them to gifts, use as ornaments or just hang them around your home."



"The necklace is best sewn by machine," says VALERIE TURER. She will show how it is made and will have printed handouts with instructions. Fabric, wooden beads and embroidery floss are all the supplies you need.



How to make small zipper bag will be demonstrated by MARCIE BRENNER. Even if you don't like working with zippers, this is a fairly quick and easy bag. Marcie will provide a handout to be posted on the Guild's website after the demo.

She purchased her lucky ticket early in the summer and often visited the quilt on display at the library.

The Bookshelf Quilt was designed and made by Barb Christ, of Canaan N.Y., who serves as the Friends' Secretary. She is an avid quilter and offered to provide the Friends Group with a lovely library themed quilt to help raise money to benefit the library. Barb began making the quilt at the Fall 2021 Crossroads retreat. The titles of the books were pieced using selvages contributed by others in attendance. More than \$1,000 was raised from the sale of raffle tickets and will be put towards maintenance and improvements in the library.

Eileen made numerous quilts through the years, and supported the Guild's many community outreach programs. It was such a treat to see Eileen's quilts. Much of her work was beautifully hand quilted.



TALL TREES

November 2022 Block of the Month • BROOKLYN QUILTERS GUILD By Eleanor Lutz and Melissa Fitzpatrick




Fabrics & Cutting

Tree (two different fabrics suggested) **A:** 2x Trees (1 per fabric), **7 x 7 in.**

Trunk (dark fabric suggested) B: 2x Trunks, **1.75x2.5in**.

Background (light fabric suggested)
C: 2x Large squares, 7x7 in.
D: 4x Small squares, 2.5x2.5 in.








Instructions

All seam allowances are ¼in. Finished block is 11x11in.

1: Draw two diagonal lines on the back of each background square (**C**) in washable marker or chalk.



2: Layer each background square (C) with a tree square (A), right sides together. With the marked background square (C) on top, sew ¹/₄in. from both sides of the marked lines. In total you'll sew four lines.




3: Cut each finished square into eight pieces.




4.Trim the triangle tips and iron flat.

5: Sew the ironed tree pieces into pairs. Each pair should be two pieces of the same color, combined like a mountain.

6. Iron flat. Pick 3 sections from each tre and trim ½ in. off the top. Leave 1 section untrimmed for each tree!



7. For each tree trunk (**B**), sew one background rectangle (**D**) onto each side of the trunk. Iron all pieces flat.



8. Sew each tree together vertically, with the untrimmed tree section at the top, trimmed tree sections in the middle, and the tree trunk section at the bottom.

9. Iron flat and sew the two trees together horizontally.

This pattern might look complicated, but it's not really. We'll use a quick sewing trick to make lots of half-square triangles at once.

Bring your block to our next guild meeting to enter the lottery and win that month's collection of blocks! If you can't come to the meeting, you can enter by sharing your block on our B.O.M. Facebook by 10a.m. the morning of the Guild Meeting. Each completed block gives you a chance to win, whether you are present at the meeting or not. Blocks will be collected from those attending the meeting in person. Everyone else will privately mail their blocks to the winner.

Sew Know: RAFFLE QUILT FOR UNICEF UKRAINE

UST A QUICK THANK You to the members that contributed sunflower blocks for the quilt. I want to acknowledge Joy West and Robin Engelman, who were kind enough to make six blocks each. I was asked to keep the quilt to a Queen size, 84X84 inches for display purposes, which worked out well as my machine frame just managed it.

I had to redesign the quilt to those dimensions. The center medallion was 42 inches and to accommodate the 12-inch Sunflower blocks, a checkerboard inner border 3-inch wide was added to increase it to 48 inches. Now the quilt was 72 inches, another 12 inches needed to be created. To echo the medallion bias binding, I cut six 1⁄2-inch squares to finish six inches on the 45-degree angle to form a chevron pattern from a striped fabric as the border. Since the outer edge was bias, it had to be stabilized to prevent stretching, so I used seam binding to stay the edge on the wrong side. To finish the quilt top, four Ukrainian Sunflowers were machine embroidered in the cornerstones.

The quilting is an edge to edge design of sunflowers that was offered by one of the Longarm quilting sites for free as was the machine embroidery design. The quilt backing is a white floral that is very sunflower like. A machine embroidered quilt label will be attached to the back.

This was definitely a labor of love as I thought about why I was making it. My hope is that it will raise awareness and resources for children in an intolerable situation, reassuring them that the world cares.
