


Gift from the Guild: Round Fabric Art Bowl Workshop

Thanks to the generous support from the Eileen Anderson fund, the Guild is offering a free class in making round fabric art bowls. It will be taught by Guild member Kirsten

Fisher who has developed a new technique for making fabric bowls and has recently written two books, one on square bowls and the second on round bowls.

These beautiful bowls make wonderful holiday gifts and once you have made one or two, they can be made in an afternoon.

This class will focus on round bowls and although the class itself is free, it is required that you purchase the book and supplies. The book, *Round Fabric Art Bowls*, is available from Kirsten or on Amazon and she will send a supply list.



The first part of the class will take place after the meeting on Saturday, October 21. The second part will be on Zoom on Sunday, October 22.

Size: 36" x 36" square.


Should feature green as a concept or color (from a dot to a lot – any amount of green).

Are you heading out to Long Island this fall? There are four delightful quilt shops in Suffolk County. Two are on the South Shore, and two are on the East End. Each is unique and carries different fabrics and classes. All of the owners are friendly and helpful, check them out if you are in the area! Remember to check the website of each shop for current hours, and for online shopping too.

SOUTH SHORE

Shop Name: Sew What's New, and Yarn too!

The name says it all! This is probably the largest of the four shops. The fabric selection is in the range of 3,000 bolts. The yarn section, although small, is crammed with lovely selections. There is a classroom and sewing machine sales and service. This shop has been in business more than 20 years under the same owner, Linda Linsenbarth. Islip is a lovely little village with some great restaurants.

The classroom is right in the main shop, and the shop's long arm is available for rent. Look for the municipal parking behind the shop.

Quilting: A Legacy of Sustainability and Creativity

Quilting is a centuries-old craft that is both sustainable and creative. It is a natural fit in today's push to reduce waste and live more sustainably.

Recently, the Brooklyn Quilters Guild received a donation of fabric from the estate of Nanette Costas, an early guild member. Nanette's donation included more than a dozen unfinished quilt projects, bundles of fat quarters, books, and larger fabric pieces. The guild is honoring Nanette's legacy and love of quilting by distributing this donation to current BQG members.

Chris Augenbraun distributed Nanette's unfinished quilts to members at the September meeting for completion and donation to our community quilt programs.

Bundles of fat quarters were sold for \$5.00 each to help offset Fabscrap fees to process our unwanted fabric scraps, keeping them out of the landfill. We raised \$104.00 from the September sale. Fat quarters were gifted as a welcome gift to our new September members, and others given away as incentives to inspire our generous and creative community.

Larger fabric pieces went to the comfort quilt committee for backing quilts and to the small raffle committee as prizes.

Many orphan blocks, scrap bags, fabric pieces, and books landed on the free table for the guild membership. Sometimes that quirky scrap is just what was needed or will inspire a whole new project!

The Brooklyn Quilter's Guild is a generous community where quilters come together to learn, create and support each other. By using Nanette's donation to create quilts for the community, the guild is honoring her legacy and helping to make the world a more sustainable place.

October 2023 - BOM HALLOWEEN LANTERNS

QUILTERS


In October, we highlight creating a **snowball**, a simple technique that rounds off a block creating the illusion of a circle or curve. The design can be used solo or in combination with other blocks. Enjoy - Linda McNeely & Heidi Swanson

The *snowball* is created with a square of fabric sewn diagonally in each corner. We

have used this technique for creating

Technique = Snowball Block finished size of 12 ½ " ¼" Seam allowance



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Fabrics & Cutting

Think Halloween! We suggest lanterns of orange, green, purple or a color you think best.


CUT:

- (1) Lantern body 8 ½" x 12 ½"
- (8) Background 2 ½" White squares; Four for snowballs, four for lantern top/bottom.
- (2) Lantern Top/Bottom 2 ½" x 8 ½" Black fabric

Assembly

MAIN BODY


- 1. Place white squares on each corner of the main fabric, right sides together.
- Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner for each block and sew just outside the line (towards corner). This allows for the piece to be folded over and create the corner element.
- 3. Trim excess fabric ¼" from seam and press corner back. Repeat for all four corners.



LANTERN TOP/BOTTOM

 Sew two white squares to each side of each black strip creating the top and bottom of the lantern.

FINISH - Sew top and bottom to the main piece to finish the block.





Bring your block to our next guild meeting to enter the lottery and win that month's collection of blocks! If you can't come to the meeting, you can enter by sharing your block on our BOM. Facebook page by 10 am the morning of the Guild Meeting. Each completed block give you a chance to win, whether you are present at the meeting or not. Blocks will be collected from those attending the meeting in person. Everyone else will privately mail their blocks to the winner.
