The Last Ask

First of all, thank you to all who participated in last month's ABC Frenzy. Despite the weather, we completed 31 ABC quilts and 2 Premie Heart quilts—many 'in progress/ almost done' quilts went home with Guild members, so we expect to receive several finished quilts at our March meeting.

The structures we have put in place to make our committees function are not static and have changed over time. At times, committee work has simply evolved and at times we have had to change how they work in order to support the needs of our Guild members. It is now time for us to support Jenn who has been a Committee of 1 since 2020.

As New Yorkers we tend to quilt alone in our spaces, but

quilting is often a collective task. We are a Guild of groups—we have groups that have taken classes together and who continue to meet to discuss their work; groups who take retreats together; groups who meet weekly at libraries. In the past, small groups of Guild members have come together to work on or complete ABC quilts. So, why not now? Granted, ABC groups have been most successful when group members are neighbors, but New Yorkers are resilient. We see the ABC urgency as an opportunity for our Guild members and for our Community Quilt committees. Working together is a wonderful way to grow friendships.

In addition to our request for a co-Chair, the ABC committee needs assistance at our meetings. There are small asks as well as larger needs. We still need: a member who will help fold completed quilts, and another who can count quilts. Since we began writing this, a Guild member has offered to deliver finished quilts to the front porch of our ABC hospital contacts.

There are many ways we can help Jenn and other committee chairs so we, as a Guild, can contunue to support people struggling with the challenges that life can bring.





BROOKLYN OUILTERS

March 2024 - BOM

Hope of Hartford

This is a fun pinwheel block featuring a partial seam, which is the focus for March. This block was 1st published in *The Farm Journal* in 1945, and was introduced to our Guild in April 1999 when Donna Rae presented it for the Block of the Month! Linda McNeely & Heidi Swanson

Hope of Hartford

Technique = Partial Seams Block size is a 10 ½ " square. ¼" Seam allowance.

.....

Fabrics & Cutting

- 1. Center 1 x 2.5" square
- Background 4 rectangles 2.5" x 4.5"
 AND 1 5.5" square, then cut each square in half diagonally twice
- 3. Outer* pinwheel 1 5.5" square, then cut in half diagonally twice
- 4. Inner Pinwheel -2-5" square, then cut each in half diagonally


Colors: Off white background fabric; Outer pinwheel solid* fabric (or reads as solid).


Assembly Steps

- 1. Make 4 triangle units with one background and one outer pinwheel fabric each (gold triangle in photo #3). Press seam to outer/solid fabric.
- 2. Add large Inner triangle to each of step #1 triangles creating 4 squares.
- 3. Add a background rectangle to each block, creating the 4 major block segments that surround the center.
- 4. Layout blocks as shown in photo #4 around center. Start with the upper left block.
- 5. Flip Center RST to starter left block. Sew partial seam along blue sew line in photo #5.
- 6. Press seam away from center (for all blocks).
- 7. Sew upper right block to left (photo #6).
- Sew remaining blocks working in a clockwise direction.
- Final seam completes the initial partial seam AND the block (#7)











TIP: The triangles are cut on the bias so to help stabilize the edges and keep from stretching, spray starch can be used.





Bring your block to our next guild meeting to enter the lottery and win that month's collection of blocks! If you can't come to the meeting, you can enter by sharing your block on our BOM Facebook page by 10 am the morning of the Guild Meeting. Each completed block give you one chance to win, whether you are present at the meeting or not. Blocks will be collected from those attending the meeting in person. Everyone else will privately mail their blocks to the winner.
