



Please make as many ABC quilts AND quilt tops as you can before the Frenzy—the Frenzy is about finishing quilts. Participants will hand tie quilts, iron, trim and prepare them for finishing.

For those who wish to make quilts in advance of the Frenzy, we will have packages of blocks with basic instructions at out January meeting.

ABC quilt size parameters are from 32 - 45".

NEW! Request for ABC QUILT KITS for January, 20th Guild meeting (and future meetings).

Purpose: ABC Quilt Kits are a time-saver option for those who prefer to sew an ABC quilt top, and want to skip the fabric-coordinating and cutting process. It's also an opportunity to circle back to that New Year's resolution to unload unwanted fabric i.e. GOT STASH?!!!

Directions: pre-cut fabric to complete an ABC quilt for easy assembly (approx. dimensions betw. 32"x45").

Include some child-friendly, colorful/floral fabrics; Shapes/blocks can be simple (squares/strips/unwanted blocks etc).

Design and cuts up to you! Assembly up to others!

Bundle, tie or bag the fabric shapes (with a simple sketch of the quilt pattern/layout) and bring to the ABC table this Sat., for other members to pick-up!

Need fabric to make kits, or do you have fabric to donate for kit-making? Let us know!

The 2024 Round Robin Challenge begins

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Dear Quilters,

We are so excited to begin our Round Robin journey together. Here are the steps to take to ensure that you are prepared to participate in the Round Robin beginning at our January meeting.

- 1. Complete your 13" 18" block and bring it to the January meeting. The person who makes the center block will be the "owner" of this quilt top. (The center block must be of your own making.)
- Include coordinating fabrics along with your center block. Add enough fabric that can be used in at least one round of the RR. The more fabric, the better. (Don't worry, you will get back the excess fabric at the end of the challenge).
- 3. Place a sheet of lined paper along with your block and fabric in a clear bag. Write your name on the sheet of paper and write "Owner" next to your name. This piece of paper will be passed on with each round and each additional maker will add their name to the paper to make sure that the owner will know who worked on their Round Robin quilt.
- 4. Please bring your package to the Round Robin table at the beginning of our January Meeting. Please do not wait until the end of the meeting to turn in your block and fabric. The Round Robin elves need time to redistribute the blocks. All the starter blocks and fabric will be placed in two-gallon zip lock bags at the January meeting by the Round Robin elves. Continue to use these two-gallon bags for each consecutive month.
- 5. Complete your first round before the February meeting and bring to the meeting along with additional coordinating fabric. Add your name as the #2 maker to the sheet of paper in your zip lock bag.

Please note that if you are not able to attend a meeting, arrange to give the Round Robin that you are working on to a friend who can attend. If you are unable to get your Round Robin to a meeting, keep the top and add an additional round until the next meeting. Members will not be able to join the challenge after the January meeting when the challenge will start.

Thinking about Borders

FOR A ROUND ROBIN CHALLENGE

EVERAL YEARS AGO, I SUGGESTED TO a small group of friends that we do a round robin within our group. No one was interested! So I was happy when BQG decided to do this in 2022.

I began a few centers back then and have completed several quilt tops this way, but still have several others in early stages. I'll discuss one example here, but each center block will present its own possibilities.

If you've participated in a round robin before, and found yourself repeating your favorite border styles, this article might help you consider other ideas for your round. Use this RR opportunity to stretch your quilting style. Here are some of the things I learned, and some of the ways that I approached each round.



Identify the design elements:

Square in a square
Hour Glass
Flying Geese
2 small triangles with a square; rectangle
Half square triangle (HST)

This is my "Center" square. I look at it and identify the design elements. The center square finishes at 4", and I see that the other units here are made of 4.5" (unfinished) squares.

Then I ask myself: How can I enlarge the center? Is there a line that can be extended? Is there a color that I think should be highlighted? Is there too much of a color in this so far and should I pull out a different color? Are the design elements in groups of two or three or more?

My first step

I make 8 HSTs in gold and green because those are the colors closest to the edge of the center block. I can extend the gold line or I can repeat the idea created by the three red squares by zigzagging the three green triangles. Each would work. Before I decide, I think about what fills in the rest of the round...the center of each edge and the corners. I've made 8 HSTs, but still need another 16 4.5" squares or their equivalent.





Next thoughts are about the corners and color placement. I'm not sewing anything yet. I'm only testing elements visually to see if they enhance the quilt top so far.



Trying plain red squares as fillers on the left, then thinking the color is too intense and maybe I should lighten it up again. So, I made the red squares into HSTs on the lower right.

One option to consider is to bring back the light green which looks like a background to the center star. It will visually lighten the corners.



Turned the green and gold HSTs again to test the bold gold line with the red squares. Also turned the red/light green HSTs to have the 2 green shades together and to have the lighter color breaking up the value.



Here I'm putting scraps of the fabric in the center of the edges. I realize I don't have enough of the gold fabric to make the hourglass squares that would continue the gold square on point, as mocked up on the left side. So I'll have to find another way to do this.



With the navy blue triangle beside the green rectangle I complete the background square on point of the dotted navy fabric. Now I'm beginning to think about the next round. I see that I can complete the gold square on point with a gold triangle in the following round. I want to experiment with fabric placement in the Hour Glass unit as shown on the right and left in the photo, but I'm not concerned yet with the next round (outer gold triangle).

I don't have enough of this gold fabric to make the four hour glass blocks. I search my stash for something that will work with the gold square-on-point being created with the HSTs. It's close enough, and by using it here I'll have more gold to add in later rounds.

I make 4 hour glass blocks to test them in the center of the edges. On to the corners!



Corner units!

When I searched my stash for the gold I used in the QSTs I found another gold ombré fabric that I think might work in the corners.

So I tested different fabrics/colors to use with the ombré.







To my eye, the light green would keep a balance in value, so that's my choice for these final corner units. I've added small amounts of two new fabrics and still have yardage of each to use in the next rounds.

This is ready to square up all the units to 4.5" and sew them around the center. It appears to me that this design leaves several options open if another quilter will be adding the next round.

To the right are two other examples of the same starting square.



These three began with the same center. The color and value placement is changed. Fun to see how different fabrics and different color placement will change the mood of the quilt.

More notes to make this fun and the best it can be—

When you first receive the quilt, allow some time to diagnose what has been done so far.

Use a smaller stitch length it you have piecing that goes to the edge of the round.

Press—so that you are passing a flat quilt to the next person! ❖

Dear friends and colleagues,

I know that some of you were looking forward to seeing my solo exhibition "Neighborhood Guilt" at the Greek Consualte General in New York after the holidays.

Unfortunately, the show was canceled four days after the opening, because the Greek Minister of Foreign Affairs, Georgie Gerapetritis, censored one of the exhibited pieces, titled "Flag".

The exhibition "Neighborhood Guilt" included two art works that address the uprising phenomena of femicide and domestic violence in Greece and internationally. The artworks were a fabric piece referring to the Greek flag and a quilt, titled "Neighborhood Guilt". Both artworks are made out of bed sheets donated by women that live in Greece, under the condition that they have used them to rest their bodies on them and dream of a world where women will not be afraid to chase their dreams and stand up for their rights.

...On Monday, December 18, 2023, the Greek Minister of Foreign Affairs, Georgie Gerapetritis censored the piece [that referred to the Greek flag] and asked for its immediate removal from the exhibition. I made the public statement: "Victims of femicide and domestic violence are heroes of the fight for freedom and life in Greece and internationally". That same day the work "Flag" was removed without my presence. On Tuesday, December 19, 2023, I went to the Greek Consulate, I deinstalled the art piece "Neighborhood Guilt" and received the "Flag" folded inside a plastic trash bag.

Sustainability and the Scrap Table

A big issue in our community is sustainability. We are working with FabScrap to keep fabric out of the environment, and our scrap table also contributes to this effort.

Thanks to all of you who have contributed scraps and many, many thanks to those of you have taken scraps and turned them into quilts. I especially want to thank Pat Decker who has made almost 300 quilts using scraps from the table!

In Pat's own words: "I have made and donated 291 quilts and tops in the 13 years I've been a member. I would guess that about 150 of them were the result of our glorious scrap table. I have also been gifted a lot of fabric by fellow members and occasionally I actually buy fabric (unbelievable, but true). Each time I start a quilt it is with the hope that my stash will diminish and somehow it never seems to work out that way. Oh, well they do say that hope springs eternal."

January 2024 - BOM

String of Illusion

This scrappy block is set 'on point', the highlighted technique for January. Use a solid color to start, then add scrappy fabric strings alternating along two sides. Linda McNeely & Heidi Swanson

Strings of Illusion

Technique = On Point Placement Block size is a 10 ½ " square. Finished size is 10" with a 1/4" Seam allowance.

Fabrics & Cutting

- 1. Starting Square one 5 ½ " solid square
- 2. Scrap strings A variety of strips 1 ½ " to 2" wide by at least 6"long to 11" long.

Assembly Steps


This is a very simple construction.

- Sew strips to two sides of the solid square in a log cabin style until you have a 10 1/2".
- Sew 1st strip is along bottom; 2nd strip is along left side. Continue alternating bottom & side.
- Trim strips as you go and press away from the square.

That's it!

Note: We will show the on point placement of the blocks at the January meeting but you can see the beginning of what it will look like in photo below.





Bring your block to our next guild meeting to enter the lottery and win that month's collection of blocks! If you can't come to the meeting, you can enter by sharing your block on our BOM Facebook page by 10 am the morning of the Guild Meeting. Each completed block give you one chance to win, whether you are present at the meeting or not. Blocks will be collected from those attending the meeting in person. Everyone else will privately mail their blocks to the winner.
