


The winner of the March Block of the Month, the Corn Cobs, was Valerie Turer. Congratulations Valerie!

Raffle Quilts for 2023 Show

We will have two raffle quilts for our major Quilt Show next year: a contemporary one led by Barbara Danzi and a traditional quilt led by Marcie Brenner. The proceeds from Marcie's quilt, which will feature blue and yellow fabrics and a sunflower motif, will go to a charity in Ukraine. Marcie's quilt will require about 60 sunflower blocks. She will demonstrate the blocks and pass out materials at the June meeting.

Meanwhile, the contemporary quilt will include 200-300 blocks in two sizes, 5 inches and 10 inches. These wonky blocks are quick and easy to make and should be made of solid contrasting colors. Directions are available on our website at https://www.quiltbrooklyn.org/2023-show-planning.



ABC Memories

I first came to the Guild meetings bearing ABC quilts. At the time, I was working at an after school program at my children's school and decided to make some ABC quilts with the children. I got some fabric from Baltic Bazaar and brought the sewn quilts to the program for the children to tie. They loved the idea of helping babies and I did the same thing at other schools that my children attended later on.

I came to the last meeting of the Guild at Camp Friendship, a community space located in Park Slope where the Guild used to meet. I met one of my students so we showed the quilts together!

The next year I joined the Guild and later that year, or perhaps the next, I took over the ABC quilt program for the Guild in approximately 1994. It was a great way to get to know other members.

At that time, I provided the members with squares that I cut to make quilts to donate and I then delivered the finished quilts to Maureen McCormick. She still collects quilts to distribute to babies at risk even though the ABC organization has ceased to exist.

The fabric came from members and from Maureen. She had the use of a classroom at St. Rose of Lima parochial school where she kept supplies of fabric. I also used the room to baste quilts on the floor, not something I would do now!!

It's wonderful to see how the program has grown over the years as each person who runs it brings their ideas and innovations to improve the provision of quilts to babies in need. �







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SEW SMART

Tips N' Tools

News gets around fast in our quilting circles, so I was really pleased to hear, via Martha McDonald, that Margaret Walsh has scissors that she finds a pleasure to use. Here's what she had to say about her Kai scissors:

"I really like my Kai scissors. I have a pair of the 5½-inch scissors, little ones you use to snip threads and the like. I have bought a few pairs of those little scissors over the years and they varied in quality and comfort — blades often not sharp enough, the finger holes not very comfortable, etc., and none of them better than using full size scissors.

"I bought the Kai scissors at a show, thinking I was wasting my money, but I liked the feel of the scissors. When I started using them I was surprised at how easy they were to use and how comfortable they are. They do all the work — sharp, easy to open, and very light. I highly recommend them."

I did my research and went to the Kai website and was amazed at the quantity of cutting tools they

have. There were professional, serrated, left handed, grooming, and even fly-tying scissors. They also have several styles of rotary cutters, blades, cutting mats and knives and different combinations of scissors in sets. Prices range from \$250 for their top of the line tailoring shears to \$18 for Margaret's scissors. You can learn more about their products in the link below.

Sew Know:

ENGINEERED POINTS

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of engineering using fabric as the base. We create our blocks using engineering and if each step is not completed accurately, the finished product will not turn out as expected. The fabric might be washed before cutting (there is an ongoing debate about this), and maybe starched before it is pressed. Then fabric is ready to be cut into the shapes needed for our quilt block pattern.

Things have changed dramatically since I began quilting 40 years ago. I started because I was teaching a needlework class at Brooklyn College and needed a new topic for each week. To say I fell in love with quilting is an understatement and it was a lifealtering experience that combined my passion for fabric and pattern-making. Back then, we used plastic, newspa-

per or cardboard to make the shapes, traced them onto the fabric and used scissors to cut them out.

As they say "We've come a long way, Baby!" The first rotary cutter was introduced for garment construction by Olfa in 1979 and it was quickly embraced by quilters. It created an entirely new industry of templates to be used specifically with rotary cutters. Previous plastic shapes were too thin for use with this new tool. Templates started with single-sized shapes and then multi-sized templates were developed.

These innovations improved speed and accuracy in the quilt-making process. Multiple layers could be cut and the pieces would be the exact same shape. Jane Hackworth Gruchacz took up quilting in retirement, but did not like the templates on the market. She used her CAD (computer assisted design) skills to design templates that did not create "dog-ears" and would be easier to match with other shapes. She had them cut in acrylic and her friends wanted them too. Jane approached Marti Michell (**frommarti. com**) and in 1995 the new template concept was marketed. They are packaged in sets to work together and there are also specialty blocks.

This idea has spread to other quilt template designers to make piecing easier. I'm not advocating going out and buying a lot of new templates, but you can purchase a Quilt Point Trimmer, they are available from many template companies. These trimmers allow you to remove the extra fabric at intersections before matching and stitching—much easier than cleaning up afterward and they take less time than unstitching and stitching again. This innovation has been also applied to quilt-cutting dies.
