
### **Eileen Anderson Fund**

# Community Quilts

At the end of the July 2023 summer retreat, Carol Lieberman reported that 27 quilts and 35 pillowcases were left at the Heritage Retreat for the **Hole in the Wall Gang**. Leona Shapiro added 3 lap quilts as well. In September, the team received 2 quilts.

In addition, the Comfort Quilt team, spearheaded by Dori Dietz and Leona Shapiro, distributed 5 twin-sized quilts to **Breaking Ground** and 4 baby quilts to **Ruth's Refuge during the summer**. In September, the team gave 10 Comfort Quilts of varying sizes to Ruth's Refuge and collected 6 quilts at the September meeting.

34 ABC Quilts were collected in June, making the total for the September 2022–June 2023 year 199 quilts. Jenn Arzberger also reported that we received a thank you letter for a donation that went to mothers of babies at Wycoff Hospital (Wycoff Heights Medical Center). To start off our new 2023–2024 quilting year Jenn collected 27 ABC and 4 premie quilts.

Six Veteran's Quilts quilts were delivered to the St. Albans Veterans Hospital in July. In September, the team received 1 quilt.

Quilts-4-Cops: Diane Prior-Holland collected 6 Quilts-for-Cops. As of September she had collected a total of 50 quilts of which 36 were given to Post-9/11 families. Diane said:

"The Quilts-4-Cops Quilting Bee was wonderful. We completed quite a few tops and blocks that will be used to complete new quilts. I thank everyone who participated and those who gave me quilts from the bottom of my heart. After a few days of rest, I'll be sewing again for the 2024 recipients.

# Labor of Love

How does one deal with loss, especially a loss that is at first broad and finite, but becomes unceasing, affecting a community of people originally connected mostly by profession?

If you are Diane Prior-Holland, you quilt, and eventually your passion enfolds that community which has evolved to welcome an expanded group that includes post 9/11 families. With Diane's daughters Rochelle and Vanessa, the community of work called Quilts 4 Cops: A Labor of Love works to honor loss and memory.

Each October a collective of quilters spends a day sewing, by hand or by machine, at a Quilting Bee held at One Police Plaza. Each year attendees are hosted by the New York City Police Department. This year:

Over thirty quilters that reside within the five boroughs of New York City attended the Quilts4Cops. org Labor of Love Quilting Bee. These women represent various quilting guilds, some of which are the Brooklyn Quilters Guild, Staten Island Quilters, "Quilting Queens" Guild -Queens N.Y. Quilters, and The United Federation of Teachers, Brooklyn campus.

I was lucky enough to be asked by my publisher, C&T, to go to the International Quilt Market in Houston this last October to present my book *Round Fabric Art Bowls*, at a Schoolhouse session. A school session is a 15- or 30-minute session, done in a classroom setting. There are several sessions going on at the same time. They are mainly attended by shop owners and media to learn what is new on the market.

The International Quilt Market is the wholesale trade show for the quilting industry. There were companies from many different parts of the world selling everything needed for quilting and then some.

The sewing machine companies were showing off the latest models, and even Featherweight had a stand, even though the sewing machines are no longer being made. True believers are still buying parts for the machine.

And of course there was fabric, fabric, fabric and more fabric. Because these fabrics will be shipped to the stores in the spring of 2024, most were pastels and flowers. Some of the big fabric manufacturers like Moda were also representing several smaller companies, which made their stand fun to explore.

Kits were a big item at the show. Many small companies showed quilts made from kits, with the pattern and the fabric packaged and ready to go.

Most of my time at the show was spent working. Besides doing a presentation of my books to around 130 people, I also did a book signing and a demonstration of how to

make the fabric bowls. I met a lot of really nice quilters, the majority were shop owners.

An extra unexpected treat was to get a first look at all the wonderful quilts at the Houston Quilt Show. Because it was not open to the public yet, and most people at the trade show were busy buying and selling, I had the show almost to myself.

There were so many beautiful quilts, and for several of the quilts the craftsmanship was at a level I have never seen

before. The winning quilt was made by Deborah Hyde and is a portrait of her granddaughter. It was so beautifully executed, and the details made you want to spend an hour just admiring how well it was done.

I walked out of the show with a whole new appreciation for the art of quilting, the part where the layers are stitched together. The quilts that really stood out for me were the quilts where the quilting was allowed to add a whole new dimension to the

patchwork. For example, the quilt pieced by Koleen Mc-Dowell after a pattern from Pride & Joy Quilting, was a good example of very fine quilting.


In this quilt, quilted by Jefferson Williams, the very simple quilting lines add life and personality to the lion's face.

All in all, it was a busy and wonderful experience. I was gratified to see the interest in my book and I enjoyed seeing

beautiful quilts and meeting many lovely people.

# Tessuti Apron Pattern

Looking for a new sewing pattern?
Ready to learn new skills?
Want to sew your precious stash?
Need fun gifts for people who have everything?
Get ready to sew a tunic style, crossover apron!

Members have inquired about the apron I wore at the September meeting. Here's information to get you started on making your own apron. AND if you need a bit more guidance, we are planning a workshop after the January meeting for a maximum of 15 people. I'd like to get you sewing the Tessuti apron! We will have more information in the December Bee.

Tessuti Fabrics is an Australian company that sells fabric and supplies. Tessuti has a presence on Instagram, Pinterest and Facebook. I found the Tessuti Apron Pattern to be a versatile pattern for myself and friends. I have sewn this pattern in cotton, linen, denim and lightweight upholstery fabric.

The pattern is free on their website. If you're printing it at home you will tile and tape 23 pages together. Tessuti offers a blog post about PDF printing. Your pets will love to help with this! I scrambled on the floor to tape mine together. I used Swedish tracing paper over the taped pattern to use on the fabric layout.

The PDF file may be sent to printing companies. Copy shop printing saves you time. Inquire about the printing price to see if it meets your needs and budget. I've heard good things about the small businesses *Brooklyn Motif* and *PDF Plotting*. Perhaps you can recommend another company?

The pattern has 4 pieces. The apron body, straps, pocket and a facing make up the finished product. The facing conceals stitching for a neat finish. I add a label to the pocket. I include a hanging loop too. I stitch the hanging loop under the facing.

Instagram has plenty of stylish Tessuti apron posts. You-Tube videos are available for free. Sewing Therapy with Sara has a succinct YouTube video on Tessuti apron construction.

Get ready to sew! Use the good fabric! You deserve it!

# Brooklyn Quilters Guild Round Robin Challenge begins

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It is not too early to begin preparations for our guild's Round Robin challenge which will begin at our January meeting. A Round Robin is a quilt that is started by one person (the "owner") who makes a center block that is passed to another quilter who adds a border of his or her choosing and then passes it to the next person who does the same. We will continue to pass the quilts to each subsequent maker at the February, March, April and May meetings. The last Round Robin participant will bring the top to the June meeting when it will be shown and returned to its original owner.

Last year we had thirty (yes 30) members participating in this challenge and the end results were incredible. (You can view them on our website.)

This year the rules for the Round Robin challenge are slightly different:

- 1. The original block must be no smaller than 13 inches square and can be as large as 18 inches square. A larger size is suggested. The block does not have to be square.
- 2. The original block must have been created by the person who submits it as its "owner". It can not be an orphan block that you found on the scrap table or were given by a friend. You must have made it.
- 3. The original block needs to be accompanied by coordinating fabrics that others can use in their construction of

- 4. Each successive quilter will add fabric to the stash that is passed along with the quilt.
- 5. Place your original block with the coordinating fabric in a 2-gallon sized zip lock bag that will be provided by the Guild and include a sheet of paper that has your name on it. Each successive maker will add their name to this sheet of paper as the quilts get passed to ensure that we know who worked on each quilt.
- 6. Be sure that you are able to dedicate time each month to this challenge before you decide to participate. Each month you will need to bring the quilt that you worked on to the meeting where it will be handed off to another maker. If you are unable to attend a meeting you will need to keep the quilt and add another round.



# Tis the Season

Just in time for the upcoming holidays, we <u>present</u> "Tis the Season" for November's BOM. The technique featured is self-sashing and it uses October's snowball technique. A simple string of blocks can make a lovely table runner. Enjoy - Linda McNeely & Heidi Swanson

Self Sashing is when the block design provides the sashing so you do not need additional strips to separate rows or columns in a quilt.

### Tis the Season

Technique = Self Sashing Block finished size of 8 ½" w x 14 ½ " h ½" Seam allowance





### **Fabrics & Cutting**

For those who may use the blocks together, we suggest white-on-white for the sashing and a red corner square. The gift and bow fabrics should be contrasting materials so the bow stands out.

### CUT:

- Gift fabric (2) 2 ½" x 8 ½" strips
- Bow Fabric (1) 2 ½" x 6 ½" strip; (1) 2 ½ " x 8 ½" strip; and (4) 2 ½" squares
- Background (1) 2 ½" x 6 ½" strip (examples shown use same fabric as sashing)
- Sashing (1) 2 ½" x 12 ½" strip; (1) 2 ½" x 6 ½" strip
- Corner (1) 2 ½" square


### **Assembly**

 Sew two 8 ½ gift strips to each side of the 8 ½" bow strip.

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- Snowball 2 ½" squares to the top of the gift. (Refer to Oct BOM for a snowball technique refresher.)
- 3. Sew 2 ½" bow fabric strip to the top of the gift
- Snowball 2 ½" bow squares to the end of background strip and add that strip to the top of the gift
- 5. For sashing:
  - a) Sew 12 ½" sashing strip to the left side of the gift
  - b) Sew corner square to 6 ½" long sashing strip AND add that to the top of the gift.
- 6. Refer to the photos for placement.
